ECCO grew out of the Musiko Musika initiative at Kensal Rise Primary School "Our Music, Our Life, Our Future" with an exceptional level of support from the school's then Head, Mrs Joyce Page.

Our story

That project's vision and objective:

The vision for this project is that we nurture and grow the spiritual, intellectual, emotional and social being of each of the participants in order for them to realise their own potential as human beings. In doing so our objective is to embed within the community a structure and social framework that supports and empowers the individual in their struggle for excellence and achievement.

That structure and social framework will be the orchestra.

The ECCO continues to evolve, but our underlying vision and aims remain. Since 2009 the ECCO project has reached over 300 children and young people.

Concerts have taken place in many different locations and types of venues including St Paul's Church Covent Garden, St Ethelburga's Church,

Bishopsgate

the South Bank Centre, Lyric Hammersmith
Tours to Dorset, Wales and Andover have taken the ECCO to rural
communities around the country.

ECCO Case Studies: A Progression routes and career pathways

'A' is a young musician who has been part of the ECCO shortly after the orchestra was first formed. They started on the violin and over time have embraced the wide extent of the instruments on offer, specialising in Latin American stringed instruments – charango and cuatro, they have also been learning about music technology and PA for live sound with ECCO, at home and their church. When they were considering applying to study theatre production after leaving school they quietly sought advice from a member of our team with a background in theatre on what might be involved and how to approach the interview.

Having been offered places to study we then helped them navigate the decision making around whether to accept a conditional offer to study at Guildhall School of Music & Drama or an unconditional offer at a less prestigious institution. This was not a simple choice for the young person, who felt cautious about the risk of a conditional offer in spite of their predicted grades being well aligned with the GSMD offer. It wasn't until we outlined the international reputation of GSMD to the young person and their parent that the opportunity GSMD presented became really clear.

'A' is thriving at GSMD, now in their third year and still very much part of the ECCO community, rehearsing with us and now working in a paid position on the ECCO Young Leaders project.

Music : Community : Diversity in ECCO

The extent of the ECCO repertoire:

133 separate items of repertoire originating from Europe (including UK), Asia, South America, and encompassing many styles and genres, time periods and origins.

The range of instrumentation of ECCO has included:

Projects have included:

Luchín – a link project with Chile inspired by the work of Chilean songwriter Victor Jara ECCO Online – during the pandemic ECCO went online for a whole year Recording at West One Studios

WMA App, enabling ECCO players to access practice and rehearsal materials easily at home through audio and videos produced by Musiko Musika

ECCO Young Leaders, ECCO Electric Band, ECCO First Steps and ECCO Dynamo, all increasing opportunities and progression pathways

ECCO London and summer courses reaching ECCO players in their communities and schools

ECCO Case Studies: B A supportive and inclusive environment for all

'B' is a young musician who came to ECCO through participating in one of our other programmes. They have a learning disability and have attended an SEN school throughout their education and have experience of the care system. At the time when we first encountered 'B' they were very shy in social situations and very unconfident about their own abilities, anxious about trying anything new.

A member of our team established a trusting relationship with 'B' and suggested to 'B' and their carer that they try out ECCO – our team member seeing an opportunity for them to develop their musical and social skills further within the supportive framework of ECCO.

'B' has flourished in the environment of ECCO, developing their skills as a percussionist which has enabled them to also take on important musical roles within their church. They are relaxed and confident in the sessions and fully integrated into the social and musical community of ECCO. Last year they were one of three ECCO young musicians invited to perform alongside our band in the Voces Festival Concert.

Music : Community : Diversity in ECCO

With its focus on social and cultural inclusion currently 84% of the young musicians involved are from backgrounds other than white European and the ensemble also includes and promotes opportunities for young people with SEN.

ECCO Family Survey 2024

The socio-economic profile of ECCO families shows 41% are in lower/ intermediate occupations/ full time education.

71% of ECCO families expressed that the impact of the cost of living crisis meant 'things are much more difficult' things are a bit more difficult'

24% said that they or someone in their family household self-identify as experiencing mental health challenges

Co-learning and collective ethos: apprenticeship

Ecco is a collaborative project, a community of young people, supported by adults, engaged in producing music. The context created by the orchestra has an apprenticeship format, in which participants learn through hands-on experience.

Playing becomes a serious business in which they seem committed to participate. A mother shared that she never had to encourage her daughter to practice, because she does it by herself; other parents expressed that their children were focused on practicing, exploring, and creating music. Most of the members of the orchestra play more than one instrument (violin, charango, cuatro, and pan pipes, for example) and they also sing. Each participant has a meaningful contribution. Playing the instrument is not only about them as individuals. It is about all of them: the orchestra.

All in all, the model of being a member of the orchestra could be characterised as legitimate peripheral participation (LPP), because newcomers become experienced members and eventually old timers of this collaborative project (Lave & Wenger 1991). Each player's role is needed and they have to pay attention to play their part in the orchestra in the best possible way.

Ecco's collective ethos is characterised by commitment to the task, enjoyment, and care to support the development of the young musicians that participate and make it be. Ecco is a big family.

ECCO is important to the young musicians who take part because...

"It's like a family. It provides an atmosphere of professionalism and growth. It's all about the colours and beauty of music from all around the world."

ECCO Case Studies: C Adapting to the needs of young people

'C' has a very challenging home life due to the mental health circumstances of their mother, a single parent. As a result 'C' themself also experiences their own issues with anxiety as well as contending with physical health problems alongside supporting their parent.

The ECCO team adapt communications and support to accommodate the family situation and to ensure that 'C' can take part as fully as they can in all ECCO activities, for example discussing and arranging personalised travel arrangements to/ from concerts.

'C"s mother recognises and greatly appreciates the role that ECCO has in the life of their child, believing that ECCO has a key role in her child's life and helping make things manageable: "I am completely blown away and speechless. I do not know how to thank you and the whole of ECCO for everything you have given C. I actually don't have the words. From the bottom of my heart, thank you"



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
